Brethren and Companions, welcome to the latest edition of The Cambridgeshire Mason, which includes some exciting news on appointments and promotions at Grand Rank and Provincial Grand Rank levels. My congratulations to them and I look forward to the respective investitures in April and on 19th June, at West Road, for our Provincial meetings.

We shared a delightful day at Quarterly Communications on 13th March and I was thrilled with the huge attendance, over 100, at the Cambridgeshire lunch which followed.

I make no apology for reinforcing yet again the importance of The Pro Grand Master's strategy for the Craft and Royal Arch which is so crucial for the future. "One Organisation, One Journey" sums it up so well, as does the suggested new first toast which I encourage all Lodges and Chapters to adopt.

The Three Strategic Pillars of Membership, Coherent Organisation and Community engagement make an inspiring toolkit by which to run our Province, lodges and chapters. We have seen two consecutive years of membership growth and 2024 has started exceptionally well. Keep it up! Maintaining a minimum of 2% improvement per annum is essential to meet the strategy. What has also been pleasing is to see the turnaround, in the last year to 15 months, of the few lodges and chapters who had been experiencing comparative difficulties. If we keep this progress going, we shall certainly justify the confidence shown by the new Assistant Provincial Grand Master appointment afforded to us by the Pro Grand Master. I think, coupled with the recent changes in Provincial Executive appointments, and those in June, we have a Province well set up to drive and support the lodges and chapters in attaining further growth.

On the community engagement front, I would encourage each lodge, chapter and masonic centre to concentrate on what they can do in their local communities. The Christmas initiatives on Foodbanks and the homeless were so successful and much needed. I challenge you to consider what can be done in the summer months for the poor, less fortunate or less able members of our local communities. There is no major Province appeal at present, so you have free rein. Please seize the moment!

We should be a supportive organisation, so I exhort senior brethren to welcome and encourage newer members or those climbing the ladder. Positive help rather than negative criticism should be the order of the day, (or evening) - something I endeavour to do whenever I visit. The Light Blues buddy initiative is working so well, and the embryo Clarets is also progressing well. I encourage you to make the visiting initiates, fellowcrafts or new exaltees etc. especially welcome when they attend your lodges and chapters. Please give them a front row seat where they can see what is going on!

We are still missing brethren and companions who used to come but haven't since 2019. It is vital that we continue to engage with them and try to encourage their return. We can all help by phoning or emailing them, offering lifts, booking them in and ensuring they enjoy their first meetings back.

Brethren, continue to help us grow this magnificent institution and enjoy your freemasonry! This latest edition reprises many important stories and items across the Province in recent months as well as previewing forthcoming events. It amply illustrates what a busy, successful and happy Province we are.

Teddies for Loving Care Warm Hearts at Hospital

Nursing staff were on hand this week at the Paediatric Department of Addenbrookes Hospital to take delivery of another batch of teddy bears supplied by Cambridge Freemasons.

The Teddies for Loving Care (TLC) scheme was introduced in Cambridge 20 years ago and since that time over 34,000 teddies have been donated to hospitals in Cambridge, Ely, Doddington and Wisbech. The scheme is funded by Freemasons from lodges across the whole of Cambridgeshire. There are 47 regional TLC programmes that provide teddies for their local A&E departments. Since its inception in 2001, 3.5 million have been distributed to hospitals throughout England and Wales.

WBro. Tony Barrios, who coordinates the scheme on behalf of Cambridgeshire's Freemasons said, "TLC is a wonderful initiative and one that is greatly appreciated by our participating hospitals and the children who receive the teddies. I am incredibly proud that it is the generosity of our members from that fund this scheme, as they recognise its importance".

On receiving the latest delivery of teddies, Grace, a 3rd year Paediatric Student Nurse said, "We use the teddies to calm children down and reward them for being brave and also as a tool to demonstrate procedures. We are grateful to the Freemasons for providing them to us"
