
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# **Annual Provincial Meetings**









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#### Highlights from the Provincial Grand Masters Address



Brethren,

I am pleased to see so many here today filling this hall and celebrating another year of progress and success in this Province. To all our visitors I extend a warm welcome and I hope you will enjoy the day — your support makes it that much more special.

The Pro Grand Master's Strategy is starting to yield results as we all embrace the challenges it presents. With "one journey, one organisation" laying a clear path for us to build an integrated organisation fit for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century and, more importantly, one fit to develop and grow, not just survive. His leadership has been truly inspirational. It is crystal clear that the Craft and the Royal Arch are inextricably linked for the future complementing each other with their respective strengths. What better than to continue to hold both Provincial Meetings on the same day at the same location thereby reinforcing the link?

Whilst we don't have a membership challenge deficit to address, we still have work to do to sustain, if not improve, our position. If each Lodge were to show net growth of just 2 members each year that would represent some 5% growth. We have shown over the last three years that we can grow overall by an average of one member so I would like each Lodge to endeavour to have achieved a net growth of two members by this time next year. It's something I think we can all achieve especially by paying due attention to reducing resignations something I want as a particular focus over the next 12 months. If we concentrate on encouraging back those Brethren who have stayed away or are out of the habit of attending, it is an easier way of avoiding membership losses.

Brethren, in some ways we are all membership officers and what is more we should relish this role of growing the Order. Encouraging friends, making introductions, supporting the exhibition trailer at local events, Masonic Centre open days, White Table evenings to introduce freemasonry at convivial dinners are all there as suitable enablers. We must encourage newer members and aspiring brethren to want to be involved and have a strong reason to continue to belong. We must be much less critical and demanding of those who, perhaps we perceive, don't appreciate or can't satisfy the standards and commitments expected 40 and 50 years ago. Open criticism in Lodge is unacceptable and in the 21<sup>st</sup> century we should aim to embrace the best of 21<sup>st</sup> century attitudes and behaviours. - especially inclusiveness and tolerance.

We are building a living organisation to thrive another 300 years or more .... not a museum of dinosaurs. I am so pleased and encouraged by the enthusiasm and efforts of the Light Blues, whilst the buddy initiative involving newly initiated Brethren in early Lodge visits has proved so successful and I know all the Rulers enjoy attending on those evenings. The Light Blues deserve our respect, support, and gratitude but most importantly our continued encouragement.


Congratulations are due to W Bro's David Parker and Mark Shields on their first appointment to Grand Rank as well to W Bro's David Blair, Paul Gillingwater, Dan Heath and John Hammond on their promotions. At Provincial level may I also congratulate all those who have today been promoted or appointed to new ranks and responsibilities. On 23<sup>rd</sup> July, W Bro. George Brennan will once again be organising a PSA testing day at Bateman Street, and I encourage all those who have not taken the test recently to sign up. It is such a sensible step to catching a potential problem early and thereby, hopefully, ensuring a cure.

#### Pantomine Stars support Local Charities



Charities in Cambridge have once again benefited from funds raised through pantomimes performed by Cambridgeshire Freemasons. The last 18 years have seen twelve pantomimes, performed at Masonic Centres in Cambridge and Newmarket, which have raised a total of £33,000.

One of the three charities which received funds from this year's performance of Aladdin was Cambridge Aid, who provide a point of last resort for those in desperate financial need within Cambridge and its surrounding villages. Other charities receiving funds were Red2Green and Bare Necessities.

Joel Limmer, Chairperson of Cambridge Aid, explained: "We offer financial help to individuals and families in need, whilst the referring organisation may be dealing with the underlying causes of distress. The grants give comfort, provide basic essential needs, and help to maintain dignity. This amazing donation will enable to continue with our charitable work."

Freemason Mark Long, pantomime director and leading dame added "Our pantomimes put the 'fun' into 'fundraising' and I believe that is why our long-running productions have such a keen cast and crew and are enjoyed by so many, we are already planning for next year".



#### 150 Years of University Royal Ark Mariner Masonry

"Isaac Newton University Lodge of Royal Ark Mariners No 112, Warranted 29 April 1874"

So, it is written on every summons for Isaac Newton University Lodge of Royal Ark Mariners No 112. With the recent successful sesquicentenary of Isaac Newton University Lodge of Mark Master Masons only two years past (delayed 2 years by COVID) and the mechanisms and requirements still fresh in mind, the likelihood was that the process could simply be repeated to gain a sesquicentenary warrant for our RAM Lodge. All we needed to do was give evidence of continuous meeting since the Consecration.

And so, the earliest Lodge minute book was located at the back of a dusty cupboard at Bateman St. Curiously, the cover is emblazoned "Cambridge University Ark Mariners No 23". No mention of Sir Isaac or our familiar number, 112.



Indeed, the very first but undated minute is headed "University Ark Mariners No 23" and refers to the then-recent takeover of RAM by Mark Grand Lodge, which event dates to 1871. This takeover was not universally welcomed.

There had been several attempts to form a separate RAM Grand Lodge and the fact that our Ark Mariner Lodge was originally numbered 23 indicates that the Lodge may have been part of just such an alternative Grand Lodge. Records show that when Mark Grand Lodge assumed control, 28 RAM Lodges were in existence. That the RAM degree had been increasingly worked in Mark lodges might have been a driver for the takeover at a time when the tribulations of setting up Mark Grand Lodge (1856) were recent memory. In the end, Mark Grand Lodge purchased the rights to the RAM degree outright in 1884 and the receipt is still retained at Mark Masons Hall.

That earliest Lodge minute book record describes in its first record the meeting of 4 brethren – Bro's Walker, Caldwell, Miller, and Wace – and the "advancement" of several Mark Masons from Isaac Newton Mark Lodge into the RAM degree. The senior candidate was Bro. Cuthbert Edgar Peek, of Pembroke College.

Peek was a student of astronomy and surveying and later as a FRAS, he set up an observatory in Rousdon, Devon, in 1884. In 1876 he is recorded as being installed as Commander of the RAM Lodge now described in the minutes as 'Isaac Newton University Lodge of Royal Ark Mariners No 112'. The old records tell us that three meetings occurred in 1876, but then.... nothing for 9 years.

Our 1874 warrant names five brethren as petitioners. Bros Bryan Walker, Robert Caldwell, Robert Miller, and Frederic Wace, together with Roger Birdwood. Who were our illustrious predecessors? All were University men.

**Rev Bryan Walker** was made a fellow of Corpus Christi College in 1866, having gained his MA that year. He was ordained deacon in 1868 and priest (Ely) in 1870. He was Rector of Landbeach, Cambridgeshire ,1871-87. Bro. Walker died on Aug. 16, 1887, aged 47, at Landbeach rectory.

**Dr Roger Birdwood** was born in India in 1851 and studied at Kings College gaining B.A. 1873; M.A. 1881; M.B. 1887; M.D. 1889. MRCS 1877. He was Medical Superintendent of Park Hospital, Hither Green, in 1909. He was Sometime General Superintendent of smallpox arrangements of the Metropolitan Asylums Board and Medical Superintendent of smallpox hospital ships, South Western Fever Hospital and North Eastern Fever Hospital, in 1884. He was House Surgeon of Gravesend Hospital, Kent and served as Civil Surgeon in the Galeka and Zulu Campaigns. Bro. Birdwood died in 1924, aged 72, at Twickenham.

**Robert Kalley Miller** was born in1842 at Kilmarnock. He studied first at Glasgow University then Peterhouse, becoming a Fellow in 1867, Bursar, 1876-84. He was Esquire Bedell, 1870-3 and Professor of Applied Mathematics at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich, 1873-5. Bro. Miller died in 1889, at Melbourne House, Tunbridge Wells.

Frederic Charles Wace was born on June 17, 1836. He was a Fellow of St Johns College, 1860-75, Senior Proctor, 1873-4 and Esquire Bedell, 1877-93. He was Mayor of Cambridge, 1890-1; Alderman of Cambridgeshire. County Council, 1889-93. Bro. Wace died Jan. 25, 1893, in Cambridge and is buried at Cherry Hinton.

**Robert Townley Caldwell** was born in 1843, in Barbados. A Corpus Christi man, Fellow, 1865-1906. Bursar 1871-99. Tutor, 1879-92. Master, 1906-14. He was called to the Bar, 1874. On the South Eastern Circuit. As bursar of Corpus Christi, he is said to have shown great business capacity in the management of the estates and finances of the College; as Master, he carried through many needed reforms. More of Bro. Caldwell later, but he died Sept. 8, 1914, in Scotland, as the result of a motor accident.

After the 1876 Lodge meetings, our next chronological record is that an emergency meeting of the RAM Lodge was summoned on 11 March 1885, and Bro. Cuthbert Edgar Peek is still listed as Commander, although he does not seem to have been present that day and his successor, Bro. CAC Jones, was installed in his stead. Charles Alfred Jones of St Johns College was both a Priest and teacher and Chaplain of St John's College, 1861-2. After the Installation, the main business of 11 March was the admission of 20 candidates. All proposed by Bro. FC Wace and seconded by Bro. RT Caldwell. Indeed, one of the candidates, Bro. D Hall, had summoned the meeting and was immediately appointed Scribe on his admission that evening. Nothing changes! Bro. Wace was appointed Treasurer, and remained so until 1891, the year he passed away.

I promised more of Bro. Caldwell – is that name familiar? After that 1885 meeting he is not listed in Lodge office again. Perhaps some explanation is that it is the same RT Caldwell who became Provincial Grand Master of the Craft Province of Cambridgeshire in 1891, until his death in 1914. His name is of course preserved in the Caldwell Lodge which meets at March.

Our continuous history really begins from that emergency meeting in 1885, and so as we cannot prove continuous working since 1874, we do not qualify for a sesquicentenary warrant – YET. As to why the Lodge did not meet between 1876 and 1885, we can only speculate. It is notable I think that the status of the RAM degree under Mark Grand Lodge jurisdiction was ratified formally in 1884, the year before, by their purchase of all rights to the degree. The earlier takeover of the RAM degree by Mark was not universally welcomed and perhaps this caused umbrage in senior University Masonic circles, finally settled by the sale. We can only speculate.

Nonetheless it is appropriate on the 150th anniversary of the issuing of the Lodge warrant to remember not only those Brethren whose names appear on it as petitioners - Walker, Caldwell, Miller, Wace and Birdwood, but also the essential contributions of Bros Wace and Caldwell in the 1885 revival. Without doubt in my mind, they saved our Lodge in that emergency meeting in 1885.

#### Discover More about the Royal Arch...

The Ceremony of Raising implies that there is more to learn, for it urges us to lift our eyes beyond our civil duties and routine existence. The Royal Arch develops this theme because it teaches us that the true secrets of a Freemason are to be found within ourselves.

Within English Freemasonry there exists an indissoluble link between Craft Freemasonry and Royal Arch Masonry. Together they constitute "pure Ancient Masonry", as defined in the preliminary declaration of the Act of Union that in 1813 created the United Grand Lodge of England.

When a Freemason has attained the rank of a Master Mason he is then entitled, after a period of one month, to be exalted into a Royal Arch Chapter to complete his journey in pure and Ancient Freemasonry.

#### 'Canter' brigia Lodge supports disabled riders



The College group of the Riding for the Disabled Association (RDA) received a boost to their funds recently following a donation of £800 from the members of Cantabrigia Lodge. Service being such a core principle of Freemasonry the RDA was an easy pick for Oliver Parr a member of Cantabrigia Lodge and a professional in the horse industry. Oliver is aware of the costs faced by the RDA. "It's not just the cost of the horses but paying for their insurance, buying their tack and rugs, the extras such as physio treatment and vet visits, and I am really pleased to assist our local RDA with their work," he said.

The Cambridge College RDA provides riding lessons and equestrian activities for young, disabled adults and is run entirely by volunteers. It offers regular, weekly lessons to riders aged between 16 and 30 which are suitable for people with all types of disabilities, including physical, sensory, and learning disabilities, with many riders having more than one type of disability.

Gillian Newsum, Chairman of the RDA College, said "The riders gain enormous benefits from the physical exercise, the contact with horses (they love stroking them as well as riding them), the social contact with other disabled riders and the confidence they gain from their achievements. All our coaches and volunteers are trained to help riders to have fun and progress whatever their disability, some of whom use specially adapted equipment to help them ride safely. For many, it is the highlight of their week."

There are normally 5 students in a group lesson and the cost of the purchase, and maintenance of the horses, is covered by the RDA. "We are constantly raising funds to cover the considerable costs of providing these activities. The £800 is a real boost to our new horse fund".

The horses live at the College of West Anglia in Milton on full working livery where they are also used in Equine and Horse Care courses. They have a varied workload, encompassing all kinds of ridden activities, and take part in lessons in stable management and equine anatomy and physiology. It was while Oliver was undertaking studies at the College that he came to see the positive impact of the RDA.


#### Thirkill Member celebrates 100<sup>th</sup> Birthday

#### 441 Regalia Repatriation



Following the receipt of a letter offering the repatriation of regalia, W Bro. Mark Duncan, Provincial Grand Charity Steward for Buckinghamshire, requested to attend our meeting in April so that he could present to the Lodge a Past Master's Jewel that had come into his possession as described below. W Bro. Duncan described how he had come into possession of the regalia of W Bro. A. A. Francis, Master of 441 in 1961.

Explaining that the actual regalia had not passed the test of time too well, W Bro. Duncan then revealed there was also a Past Master's Jewel, which has the inscription on the reverse side, 'Presented to W Bro. A A Francis by the officers and Brethren of the Lodge of the Three Grand Principles, January 1962'. W Bro. Duncan believed the jewel to be made of gold as it is quite heavy and appears to bear hallmarks. There is also another which may be a charity jewel, on which is engraved on the rear, 'Bro J W Pretty'. As there is no date or any other inscription, he believes this jewel is also produced from gold as it is also hallmarked.

W Bro. Duncan then further explained that he would like to return these items to our Lodge, being the permanent property of the Lodge. Added to these two Jewels are various ritual books etc. More revealing was that there is also present a document naming all Lodge members and their addresses for the year 1966. It appears that we had 119 members, giving the date of them being initiated as well as the date they became Master Masons. Curiously it doesn't list their passing date, however it does give the year they went into the chair, W Bro. Francis is number 49, showing he was initiated on 5<sup>th</sup> May 1947, Raised May 3rd, 1948, and Worshipful Master in 1961.

W Bro. Duncan then further revealed two copies of a summons from January and September 1966, naming all past masters from 1836 to 1965 including W Bro. J. W. Pretty recorded as your past master in 1931 as engraved on the jewel.

The Lodge of The Three Grand Principles is and always will be most grateful for the return of these items as they are a very valuable part of our Lodge history and potentially Cambridge Social history.

#### Rose Croix Districts Annual Service of Thanksgiving



The Cambridge & Isle of Ely District Rose Croix has been in its present form since 1998 now under the leadership of its 3rd Inspector General, V:III: Bro. Justin Curtis 33°. However, Ancient & Accepted Rite masonry existed in the area long before that when from 1874 Eastern Central District was formed by Supreme Council. East Anglia District succeeded it in 1926. With the growth in the Order flourishing, 1976 saw East Anglia further sub divided with the formation of the District of Norfolk & Isle of Ely and the District of Suffolk and Cambridge. However, the 1998 re-structuring brings us up to date by the formation of the District of Norfolk, the District of Suffolk and the District of Cambridge & Isle of Ely.

Because of those valuable historic ties, the 'family' of Rose Croix Masonry in East Anglia is a very close one. Since 1998 each district has hosted in turn an Annual Service of Thanksgiving. This year it was the turn of Norfolk, and the service was held as a Choral Evensong on Sunday 7th April at Wymondham Abbey, just a few miles west of Norwich. Supported by eighty Brethren, wives, and partners of all 3 districts it was a most uplifting and enjoyable event rounded off with afternoon tea in the Preceptory.

The Abbey at Wymondham is one of the grandest religious buildings in East Anglia. It is a magnificent example of a Norman church, originally established in 1107 as part of a monastic foundation. It was later enlarged and embellished with a particularly fine angel roof. The unusual twin towers are a prominent local landmark. At the east end of the nave the magnificent great gilded screen (reredos, with tester and Crucifixion figures) shown in the photograph, is a memorial to Wymondham people killed during the Great War. Its famous designer, Sir Ninian Comper, based it on medieval screens. It features several saints with connections to the Abbey, including Patrons Our Lady and St Thomas Becket. The screen was constructed in stages and finished in 1934.

For 2025, the Service of Thanksgiving will be hosted by the District Cambridge & Isle of Ely and will be open to all Masons whether of the Order or not. Watch out for further details.

Important - When booking please ensure you give your full firstname/s do not use shortened names such as Bob or Andy etc. Please make sure it is your full given name. Please also ensure your NHS number is correct. Failure to do so will result in your sample being rejected by our labs.

We will be working with CCL at this event to trial Proclarix, a new generation blood test, that can be used in addition to PSA testing to help diagnose patients with prostate cancer. Although PSA is a good indicator, the Proclarix test, in addition to PSA testing looks at additional biomarkers present in the blood, that are involved in clinically significant prostate cancer.

If your PSA score is between 2-10 ng/ml, the Proclarix test can be carried out using the same blood sample that was used for the PSA test.



NB. PSA screening blood tests are for men aged 40-80 who are not already on treatment or under care for a known prostatic condition. Screening is strongly recommended for men of black African and Caribbean heritage and men with a family history of prostate cancer, breast or ovarian cancer who are at high risk from prostate cancer.
